

J. M. Gamberman Rites Today

Funeral services for Jacob M. Gamberman, owner of a pawn shop, will be held at 11 A.M. today at the Sol Levinson funeral establishment, 6010 Reistersown road.

Mr. Gamberman, 79, died Wednesday at Sinai Hospital after a 10-day illness. He had resided at 3952 West Northern Parkway.

Born in Russia, he came to Baltimore as a boy and soon opened his own tailor shop on Hilton street. After his son, Bernard, returned from World War I they opened the G and G Loan Office, a pawn shop, at

1014 South Charles street. Mr. Gamberman was active in the business until his illness.

Besides his son, he is survived by his wife, the former Gertrude Schwartz; two daughters, Mrs. Bertha Himelfarb and Mrs. Shirley Friedlander, of Baltimore; a brother, Louis Gamberman, of Baltimore; five sisters, Mrs. Ann Pachino, Mrs. Cele Goldberg, Mrs. Bessie Shemer, and Mrs. Nettie Kempler, also of Baltimore, and Rose Goldsmith, of Harrisburg, eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Rites Held For Young Getty's Wife

Rome (Reuter)—The body of Mrs. Talitha Getty, daughter-in-law of Jean Paul Getty, American millionaire, was taken yesterday to a Rome cemetery for cremation Tuesday.

Only one unidentified woman accompanied Mrs. Getty's coffin to the Verano cemetery, where a brief Calvinist funeral ceremony took place. There were no flowers, and her husband, 38-year-old Jean Paul Getty, Jr., was not present.

According to cemetery officials, Mrs. Getty's ashes will be placed in an urn and taken to the Netherlands where they will be buried next to those of her

mother near Amsterdam.

Dutch-born Mrs. Getty, who left a three-year-old son called Tara Gabriel Galaxy Gramophone, died Sunday in her husband's luxurious Rome apartment the day after flying here from London. She was 30.

Her personal doctor said the cause of death appeared to be barbiturate poisoning. The results of an autopsy have not been made public.

Mr. Getty told police after his wife's death that he started divorce proceedings against her two months ago in London and that they had an argument on the evening before her death.
